Read/Reflect

- 1. Read Genesis 12:1-3. What is the significance of God's instruction for Abram to leave his country and his people (that is, why would God make such a request; see Hebrews 11: 8-10)? What promises does God make in exchange for Abram leaving his land? Are those promises convincing for you to follow God's command?
- 2. Read the book of Ruth (4 short chapters), or at least review the story of Ruth. What did it take for Ruth to find a home in a foreign land? What was the role of Boaz? If you consider that Naomi is meant to represent all God's people, what is the significance of Ruth 4:16, 17?

Explore

- 3. The number of forcibly displaced people in the world is estimated at 110 million, caused by a complex of issues like ethnic genocide, civil war, hunger, extreme poverty, drought, and floods all of which are rooted in things like political conflict, religious persecution, violence, human rights violations, development of megaprojects that ruin homes and livelihoods, and environmental factors.
 - What about this, or other, information that you've heard is new to you, surprises you or challenges you?
 - What emotional response do you have to this information?
