- 1. Read Acts 9:1-9. Recognizing that Saul was not a criminal, but an extremely faithful and well-respected religious leader (a leading Pharisee), what was his motivation to stamp out the Christians? Consider the Jewish perspective on God's mission in the world, and Jesus' perspective (Acts 1:8).
- 2. Read Acts 9:10-19. Reflect on what it was like for Ananias to accept the assignment that God gave him (9:11). What was it like for him to go from "this man and all the harm he has done" (vs.13) to "Brother Saul," (vs.17)?
