

ACTS – Faithful Witness Lucky!

Read/Reflect

- 1. Read Acts 20:1-12. Look at a map of Paul's third missionary journey to see where he travelled. At Acts 20 he begins his return to Jerusalem (Acts 19:21)
- 2. Jesus in the midst of all his travels also aimed for Jerusalem, where like Paul (Acts 21:27-36), he was arrested, and subsequently put on trial. Both scenarios happen around the Feast of Unleavened Bread (Luke 22; Acts 20:6), both involve breaking bread together (Luke 22:7ff; Acts 20:7), and both recall people falling asleep (Luke 22:45f; Acts 20:9). Do you think these parallels are coincidental or is Luke suggesting something about Jesus and the church? What would it be?
- 3. Paul raising Eutychus to life sounds like the story in I Kings 17:19-23; also II Kings 4:32-35; also Acts 9:40-41. Jesus also raised three people from the dead. What do you make of these parallels?

Explore

- 4. Have you ever fallen asleep in church? How did you justify or excuse it?
- 5. How should the story of Eutychus falling asleep in church be explained?
 - ☐ A big warning for all who fall asleep spiritually.
 - ☐ We should make every effort not to make church boring.
 - ☐ Church will be tiresome, but press on, you have a celebration to attend!
- 6. What should worship services look like today? Acts 20:7-12 is one of the first descriptions of a Christian church gathering for worship (another might be Acts 2:42-47). From the passage what parts are mentioned? What parts carry on into today's worship gatherings?

Pray

- Pray for the church (perhaps specifically in Canada);
 - for God to guard and guide it in a time when many are dismissing the church,
 - for forgiveness and God's mercy when the church contributes to troubles in our world.
 - for renewal when we are hearing and seeing hints of deep desire for faith among younger generations.
